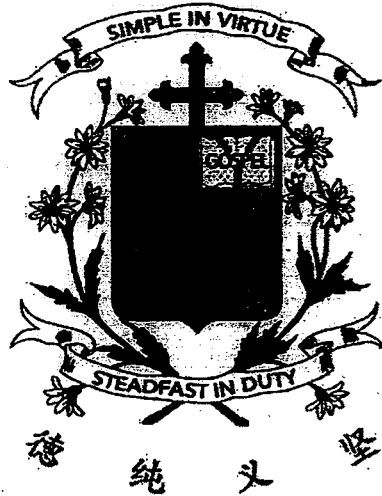

Trains are an important mode of transport. They have been used to haul people, animals, goods and produce across great distances for many years. They connect cities and countries and make travel over land possible for people.

Conventional trains are built on wheels and travel on tracks. However, there are some modern trains, called maglev trains, which are superfast. The word 'maglev' is derived from "magnetic" and "levitation". Maglev trains levitate or fly over the railway tracks that they travel on. They move using the magnetic field that is created in the track. With little friction to slow them down, they move very quickly, at unbelievable speeds.

In countries where people use trains to travel to work, these superfast trains not only offer great speed, but they also run very quietly and are more energy efficient.

The Library's 10 Golden Rules

1. Switch off/put to silent mode your handphones.
2. Speak softly at all times in the library. Do not group around tables or move chairs from other tables.
3. Walk, do not run.
4. Handle all library materials and facilities with care. Do not mess up books on the shelves or climb on furniture.
5. Queue for services.
6. Take only a few books from the shelves at a time and return them to the book bins/shelves after you have read them.
7. Limit your reading of newspapers to 30 minutes per newspaper (one at a time) to give others a chance to read them.
8. Limit the use of the Catalogue Station to 10 minutes at a time to give others a chance to use them.
9. Consume food and drinks purchased from the café in the café only.
10. Sit at designated areas. Do not sit on the floor among shelves, in the aisles and block other people. Do not sleep in the library.

There will be officers, known as Etiquette Ambassadors, on patrol. If you see library users behaving badly, kindly inform the Etiquette Ambassadors. Library users who do not show good etiquette may be asked to leave the library.

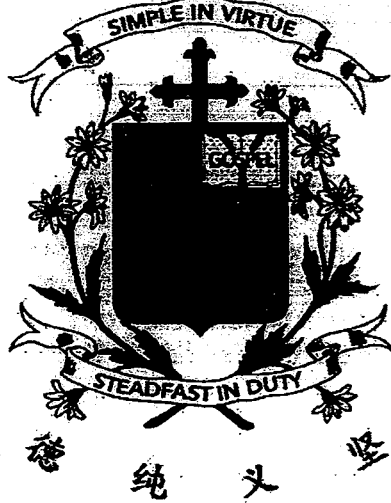

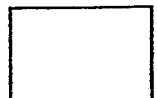

Highly popular, F1 racing is a motorsport in which drivers race each other in super-fast cars. Schumacher was an F1 racer for 19 years until he retired in 2012. He won the world championship seven times – a feat no one else has achieved.

Schumacher came from a poor family. His father did not earn much money from his job as a bricklayer – a person who builds walls and other structures using bricks. It was not easy for Schumacher's family to make ends meet. But Schumacher's incredible strength and determination made possible his rise from a humble family background to become the most successful driver in F1 history. He did this through hard work and self-discipline. His competitors admired him for his single-minded determination to overcome obstacles. 5 10

Unfortunately, some years after his retirement, Schumacher was involved in an accident. He was skiing with his son and some friends in France. Skiing is a sport in which people slide down snow-covered mountain slopes by using a pair of long, narrow and flexible strips called skis that they wear on their feet.

Schumacher was an experienced and careful skier. In spite of that, he crashed into a partially hidden rock. The impact flung him against another rock. He hit his head so hard that his helmet split into two pieces. He was immediately taken to a hospital. 15

Doctors found that his brain was damaged and terribly swollen as a result of the blow to his head. There were big blood clots in his brain, causing him to go into a coma. Doctors tried to remove the blood clots. Meanwhile, his family and friends hoped that the former F1 champion would demonstrate the same grit and determination he had shown in winning F1 races to pull through and wake up. 20

After some months, Schumacher made progress and finally regained consciousness. He is currently paralysed and needs to relearn basic skills like walking, talking and remembering simple things. Compared to how he had lived his life on the fast lanes of F1, where he could do everything accurately and quickly, this must be extremely difficult and frustrating for him. 25

A well-loved personality known by many from all walks of life and around the world, Schumacher will have to summon every ounce of his courage and fighting spirit to go right back to the starting line of an entirely different race of recovery – that of a long, slow and hard recovery. 30

"I never thought I was the best or unbeatable," Schumacher once said in an interview. Perhaps that was what kept him unbeatable in F1 racing for many years. There is no doubt that Schumacher has what it takes to overcome the difficulties on the road to recovery. 35
